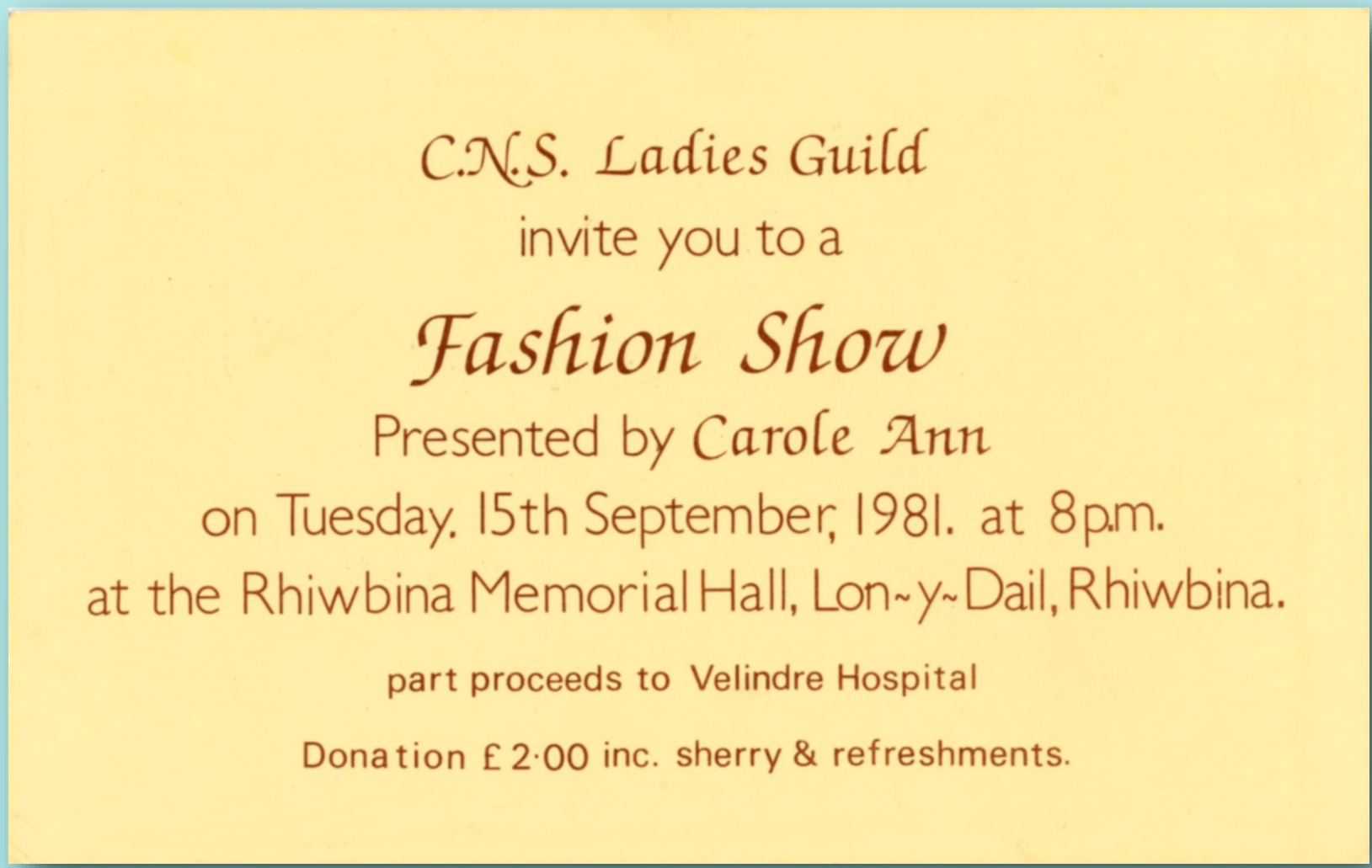

“Dad was always involved in the synagogue whereas mum was more involved with other women if you like, women’s groups and the Save the Children as I said...we’ve got pictures of her, sort of, holding the hands and dancing with the kids on the grounds of the Jerusalem Baby Home. That was her thing, you know, she absolutely loved and worked for. And she worked for WIZO [Women’s International Zionist Organisation], oh, almost until she died, I suppose...So yes, because she had done so much work for WIZO...the group then changed the name...I think it was just plain WIZO, or Cardiff WIZO, maybe, to the Betty Silver Group.”

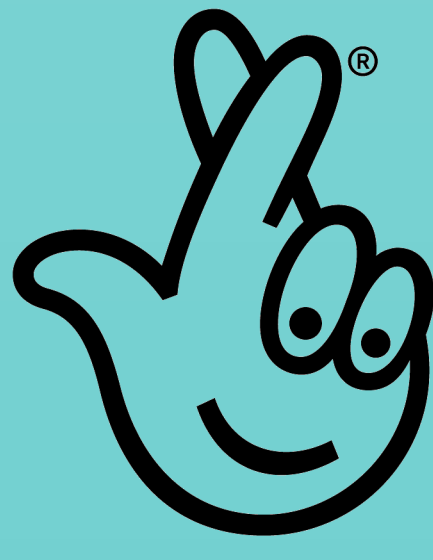


Photograph of Cardiff WIZO members taken to celebrate the opening of the Jerusalem Baby Home, 5 May 1955.

“On a Saturday, after the Synagogue there — there always is what they call a Kiddush which is a nice spread of goodies and drinks, tea, coffee, whatever you want. So, the — the Ladies Committee put on — always put on a very nice Kiddush but also various other groups called Ziona, there’s the Luncheon Club which caters for elderly or infirm people to go for a lunch on a Tuesday. The...Old Age Home puts on a lunch on a Thursday for anyone who wants to go there. There’s the...communal magazine, activity committee, there’s a care committee for looking out for the infirm or elderly, yes, so there’s something for many people.”
