A MESSAGE FROM JHASW/CHIDC:

This November marks the fifth anniversary of JHASW/CHIDC. Since receiving our first grant in 2018 from the National Lottery Heritage Fund, we have pursued a number of projects, all consistent with our aim to uncover, document, preserve and share the cultural heritage of Jewish communities in South Wales.

Our objective to share our outputs has been pursued through a number of channels particularly People’s Collection Wales. We were therefore extremely pleased to receive a feedback letter from PCW regarding a recent project we undertook to develop a set of locally relevant Holocaust materials for use in schools in Wales. The letter included the following:

On behalf of the Trustees, I thank Klavdija, Rob, Laura, Mike and our wonderful volunteers for their stellar work.



Spotlight on:

JHASW/CHIDC Social Enterprise

As our fifth anniversary approaches, it has become increasingly necessary to develop different means of funding and so, we are developing a range of social enterprise projects.

For the past six months, we have had a team working on family history research. We often receive emails from people who once had relatives in south Wales, and want to find out more about them. We are also experienced in locating records and information from European archives and helping individuals to uncover what happened to family members during the Holocaust. We are also more than happy to research family history with no connection to Wales. Please get in touch if you would like more information or a quote.

After developing our own extensive archive of oral history interviews, we will be offering packages for families wishing to document their own lives to pass on to future generations. These can range from whole life stories to a snapshot of your most treasured memories – these completely bespoke packages will be designed individually and you can choose from a range of final formats including audio files, video recordings, written transcripts or a hardback book with photographs. Our past projects have also enabled us to draw up training packages. These will be offered to groups wishing to gather and document their own specific histories. The training will cover essential skills, such as gathering, handling, scanning and preserving primary sources. We will also show smaller organisations how to deposit these with a local archive, or set up or contribute to an existing online archive. We will also be offering a training package for organisations wishing to develop virtual trails around their local area, or carry out oral history projects.

We are looking forward to working with other organisations and sharing the knowledge that we have developed. We are excited to be offering these new packages. Please get in touch if you would like to know more.

PROJECT UPDATES:

The European Network of Testimony-based Digital Education

This project, delivered in partnership with organisations in the Czech Republic, Hungary, and the Netherlands, is funded by the European Commission and is part of their Erasmus+ programme. Ten Holocaust education activities have been developed.

Côf a lithr, llythyrau a geidw: creating Holocaust resources for Welsh schools

This project ended on 30 September. Delivered in partnership with The Centre for the Movement of People at Aberystwyth University, and funded by the Association of Jewish Refugees, Charles Wolfson Charitable Trust, Jewish Historical Society of England, and Garfield Weston Foundation, we developed 20 Holocaust resources for teachers and students in Wales. All resources were published on People's Collection Wales (PCW) and Hwb, the Welsh Government educational portal.



Swansea Heritage Trail

The Swansea & District Heritage Trail is on course to be launched in January, so there is still time to send us information. There are some specific items we would like help with. We have been unable to establish the Jewish connection to the Windsmoor clothing factory in Fforestfach. We know that the factory made clothing for retailers like Marks and Spencer, and have some accounts and photos of women who worked there. But we have not been able to find out about who founded the factory, or its history.

OUR NEW PROJECTS:

Sharing skills: Enabling communities to preserve their heritage

In July this year, we were awarded a grant from the Welsh Government Volunteering Wales Main Grant programme, administered by Wales Council for Voluntary Action. The project started in October. Its aim is to get a wider range of people into heritage, and enable participants to gain skills and experience in heritage. We will recruit a wide range of volunteers, focusing on engaging with those from minority ethnic communities in Butetown, Grangetown, and Riverside.

Volunteers will work with Cardiff Reform Synagogue historical records. They will receive training in heritage skills and accreditation; they will also visit archives and museums and talk to heritage experts.

What's in the suitcase?: Cardiff United Synagogue archive discovery and preservation

In October, we started a new project to preserve and make publicly available the records of Cardiff United Synagogue. The records date back to the 19th century, and survived the floods of 1979/80. The records will be catalogued, repacked, digitised, and deposited with Glamorgan Archives. A selection of the digitised material will be uploaded to People's Collection Wales.
